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AUGUST

On August 9th, we celebrate the International Day of the World's Indigenous People, a day to protect and promote the rights of the world's estimated 370 – 500 million indigenous people. Living across 90 countries, indigenous people worldwide have sought recognition of their identities, traditional lands, and natural resources. Historically, their rights have always been violated. On this day we celebrate indigenous people and share in their mission for acceptance and recognition within the world.

MARCH

The island of Puerto Rico has a rich heritage and culture. Following the Spanish-American War, the United States acquired Puerto Rico as part of the Treaty of Paris. Its citizens were extended U.S. citizenship in 1917, and since then millions of Puerto Ricans have come to the U.S. mainland. Lin Manuel Miranda, creator of the Broadway musical Hamilton, is a Puerto Rican American whose first Broadway show, *In the Heights*, tells the story of Latinx characters in the Washington Heights neighborhood of New York City. We all have stories to tell that can reflect our culture and heritage. This month, explore and share the stories of students within your class.

Our favorite poet to highlight is Rita Dove, an African American poet who wrote the poem "First Book," after which our organization was named.

MAY

In the United States, May is Asian American and Pacific Islander Heritage Month. May was chosen to commemorate the immigration of the first Japanese to the United States on May 7, 1843, and to mark the anniversary of the completion of the transcontinental railroad on May 10, 1869. The majority of the workers who laid the tracks on the project were Chinese immigrants. It's a good time to highlight the stories and cultures of the 24.5 million U.S. residents of AAPI heritage.
