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AUGUST

The beginning of the school year is also the beginning of the season for many athletes and sports fans. Encourage students to honor groundbreaking athletes like Althea Gibson. Gibson excelled at tennis at a young age, but in the 1940s and 50s, most tournaments were closed to Black Americans. Gibson kept playing and winning despite this challenge and eventually became the first Black tennis player to compete at the U.S. National Championships (1950) and Wimbledon (1951).




JANUARY

Happy New Year! On January 16th, we celebrate Dr. Martin Luther King Jr.'s birthday as a day of service. Dr. King was a changemaker who showed that every voice matters and everyone has the power to make a difference.

TRY THIS!
